pictures, almost exclusively slides. Most of the pictures I took were birthday and holiday gatherings, despite the uncertain performance of the attachable flash with expanding fan reflector and individual bulbs. Surprisingly there were quite a few very nice shots of the Big Snow of "67 in Chicago and lots of Colorado scenery pictures of rocks and trees from who knows where.

When that camera gave up the ghost in '80 I purchased another Yashika and began taking color snaps. I purchased a similar camera for use at City Hall. It came in very handy when documenting various construction projects, especially when I took it along to document punch list items for unpaid contractors. It also was handy to document the construction of the sew-erage treatment facility. Each time the Federal inspectors came, I would take pictures from designated locations as progress pictures that would coincide with their reports. I'm not sure of the whereabouts of these pictures now but think they may have been discarded.

Most of my photography continued to be family album shots and big snows until 3 years ago when my older brother, who had discarded his C-3 many years before, gave me a well-used Nikon FA with many zoom and long distance lens. He was and is an avid Birder and wanted me to get into the hobby too. He had become enamored with a camcorder and a small digital point-and-shoot camera that he could put up to a spotting scope for some neat shots. Once I got the hang of winding the film on the spool so it would actually wind, I managed some pretty decent shots, especially with the 500 lens, (which I had never used before).

On a recent trip to south Florida with big brother we ran into a couple professional wildlife photographers who urged me to go digital. The learning curve is much shorter and not so steep. A few days later we ran into another lady photographing butterflies and she also urged me to try a digital – Buy the best you can afford. While the advice was well received I was a little skeptical of spending \$1000 & more for a camera, but the fact that her cap read "National Geographic Staff Photographer" added weight to her words. So My Christmas present to myself was a Nikon D70 with a couple lenses and an Epson printer (actually 2 printers) for processing my own photos.

I am in the process of (continuing process) of learning what my Nikon will do and how to use Photoshop Elements and many of the neat tricks that can be done with digital photos on a computer. I have also had Wal-Mart put many of my old slides as well as negatives on CDs. Hopefully I may be able to computer adjust some of my previous photo efforts to showable (or hangable) quality.

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
